The cessation of war with France in 1815 resulted in a reduction of the military staff in Guensey and, despite remonstrances from the States, or Parliament, meant the recall in the following year of Lieutenant-General Doyle. The Lieutenant-Governor had greatly endeared himself to the people of Guernsey and this feeling was mutual: some days before his departure, Doyle laid the foundation stone of Torteval Church and 'then endeavoured to address the assembly, being greatly moved not only by the ceremony but also because of his impending departure. He broke down and was assisted to an adjoining tent'.

A handsome cup was subsequently presented to him whilst the monument erected at Jerbourg Point in recognition of the respect, esteem and admiration of his high and distinguished talents encompassed simply the general sentiment 'Doyle-Gratitude'. The obelisk was removed during the Occupation but was replaced by a different design in 1953.

The fourth stamp in our set is a portrait of the


Lieutenant-General taken from a painting of 1817 by James Ramsey; in the background of the complete work can be seen the Jerbourg monument. Superimposed on the portrait is a reproduction of Sir John's Coat of Arms. A baronetcy had been conferred in 1805 and he had been awarded the Grand Cross of the Bath by the time that the painting was commissioned.

Promoted to General in 1819, Doyle became Governor of Charlemont. He returned to Guernsey in 1826 and received an enthusiastic reception; the Militia made him a presentation of a silver obelisk with his Coat of Arms.

A bachelor, Sir John died in London in 1834. He had experienced 23 general actions, was wounded eight times and received nine expressions of thanks in Parliament. The nicknames of 'Popularity Jack' and 'The Soldier's Friend' only confirm the high esteem in which he was held by the humblest and the highest.



























































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
